

Marlborough's first unity week

The Welcoming Communities – Te Waharoa ki ngā Hapori Programme was very honoured to have worked with the Marlborough Multiculutral Centre and the Marlbororough Red Cross in organising the first Unity Week event for Marlborough.

Unity Week is an initiative started in 2022 by the Sakinah Community Trust, a women-led organisation comprising family members of those lost in the terrorist attack at two mosques on March 15th 2019. The work of the Sakinah Community Trust is a way to honour the legacy of those lost to this tragedy and to ensure that the goodwill generated after the attacks is enabled to continue in a positive way. The women behind Sakinah Community Trust and Unity Week believe that everyone, regardless of their background or community, should feel welcome, respected and



loved for who they are and where they come from

To celebrate social cohesion and bring people together, Marlborough's Unity Week event was a special morning tea at Connect and a visit to the Marlborough Art Society's "Cultural Kaleidoscope" exhibition. Over 50 people attended the event from the Rohingyan community, English Language Partner classes, Marlborough Multicultural Centre and representatives from Council and community organisations.

The morning tea was a great chance to catch up with friends, meet new people and find out about services in the community like Volunteer Marlborough and the Citizens Advice Bureau. After coffee, cake and some delicious homemade food Anne Barrer, president of the Marlborough Art Society, gave the group a tour of the art exhibition which celebrated Marlborough's diversity and had art created by Marlburians, old and new.

Strangulation the context of Intimate Partner Violence – A Public Health Issue

Family Violence Workshop Series BLENHEIM, 16th June 2022

About this Presentation/Workshop

It is critical that agencies, professionals and the wider community recognise the signs, symptoms and dynamics associated with strangulation in the context of intimate partner violence (IPV). Described as 'a red flag on the trajectory to homicide', strangulation together with other associated risk markers should be considered in all risk assessment and safety planning processes.

This workshop also introduces topics such as traumatic brain injury (TBI), sexual violence, threatening behaviour and other factors including ACEs (Adverse Childhood Experiences) to enhance decision-making and ultimately safety for victims, families and whanau.

By the end of this workshop participants will be able to:

- · Define strangulation in the context of intimate partner violence
- · Describe the signs, symptoms and injuries associated with strangulation
- · Know some of the resources available to facilitate effective documentation
- Understand behaviours often associated with strangulation including TBI, sexual violence, threats and separation
- Apply learnings to risk assessment and safety planning
- Consider how an awareness of ACEs could be included in current organisational practice.

The presenter

Rob has worked in the family violence sector for over 30 years. His work in this area was recognised in the New Year Honours list in 2006. He shares his experience as a police officer, a national and international advisor, a member of the Family Safety Team National Steering Committee and New Zealand Family Violence Death Review Committee.

Rob has developed and delivered training to many groups throughout New Zealand on a range of family violence-related topics. Leading up to and since the introduction of specific strangulation legislation, Rob has delivered presentations at workshops and conferences throughout New Zealand, raising community awareness of strangulation in the context of intimate partner violence as a significant public health issue.



When your bro starts talking about what he's been going through, you should:


- Keep calm and really listen to what he's saying.

Watch out for wheelie bin letter

Most Marlborough property owners will receive a letter from Council in the next few days asking which wheelie bin size they would like to use when the new service rolls out on 1 July 2024.

The new wheelie bin kerbside collection areas include Blenheim, Grovetown, Havelock, Picton, Rarangi, Rai Valley, Renwick, Seddon, Spring Creek and Tuamarina.

Council's Solid Waste Manager Dr Alec McNeil said the standard wheelie bin size is 140 litres and if property owners are happy with that, they don't need to do anything.

"If people would prefer a smaller (80 litre) or larger (240 litre) bin set size, they need to let us know by scanning the QR code on the form included with the letter, or by filling out the form and returning it to Council in the pre-paid envelope provided," Dr McNeil said.

"We need this information by 30 April so we can

order the wheelie bin sizes people want. If we don't hear back we will provide the standard size," he said.

If people are unsure which size best suits their needs they can visit the Marlborough District Library (Blenheim), the Picton Library and Service Centre or the Council's office in Blenheim during April to view the wheelie bins on display.

Dr McNeil said for those who are on the kerbside collection route for rubbish and recycling, the wheelie bin size selected applies to the bin set - there is not an option to choose one size bin for recycling and a different size bin for rubbish.

Under the new service, kerbside rubbish and recycling will be collected fortnightly on alternate weeks. People will be provided with one wheelie bin for rubbish, one wheelie bin for recycling (excluding glass) and a recycling crate for glass only.

There is no opt-out option and the cost of the

wheelie bin service is paid through the rates of those included in the collection areas.

Commercial customers will need to select the wheelie bin size they want for their rubbish. Please note commercial customers in the Blenheim CBD and in Redwoodtown will not receive a letter and will

instead be communicated with directly.

Changes for Interislander vehicle check-ins

On Monday 3 April the Interislander ferry check-in for private vehicle passengers will move to a new site off Lagoon Road. This means traffic arriving in Picton will need to turn left at Kent Street instead of going straight ahead to Auckland Street. Once inside the terminal passengers will be directed into a new marshalling yard where Interislander staff will help people boarding.

This change is another step in the Waitohi Picton ferry terminal redevelopment project. It's part of the enabling works underway to get the site ready for the arrival of the first of two new purpose-built, hybrid-electric ferries in 2025.

Another milestone is the new temporary terminal building on Auckland Street which is almost complete and will be open for foot passenger checkin in mid-May.

There's a lot of construction activity scheduled in the terminal area over the next few months. This includes the construction of two new commercial jetties just north of the Edwin Fox Museum, moving the rental kiosks to a new location in the lower car park and increasing capacity at the outlet end of the Waitohi culvert. Work will also start soon on decommissioning the old terminal building.

Old library building closes on 23 April

Mark Sunday 23 April on your calendar. That's when the Marlborough District Library in Blenheim closes.

But don't panic - in the lead up to the library closing you can take out as many books as you like and return them once the new library and art gallery opens on Friday 12 May. Items won't be due for return while the library is closed and no fines will be

imposed.

Once the new library opens you can return them there.

For the three weeks between the Marlborough District Library (Blenheim) closing and the new Marlborough Library and Art Gallery opening,

Libraries' Manager Glenn Webster suggests customers make sure they take out enough books to keep them going.

Mr Webster also reminds people they can access the online facilities while the library is closed.

"Customers can use our online resources with their membership card including the newspapers," he said. "And the Picton Library and Service Centre will be open as normal."The popular Justice of the Peace service, with local JPs present at the Marlborough District Library on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday from 10.00 am until 12.00 pm, will continue at the Citizens Advice Bureau in Alfred Street.

JPs' new home during library closure

Many Marlborough people use the Justice of the Peace service offered at the Marlborough District Library.

During the library closure – the Blenheim library closes on Sunday 23 April for three weeks – the service will be available at the Citizens Advice Bureau in Alfred Street instead.

Ian Camerson, Registrar for Marlborough Justices of the Peace Association, said the service was very popular.

"Although Covid requirements meant the centre could not open for much of the last year, in 2020-2021, 3,500 people attended and more than 8,900 documents were processed."

Work carried out by Justices of the Peace includes witnessing signatures on documents, certifying copies of documents, taking oaths, declarations, affidavits or affirmations, and confirming identity.

Justices will be at the CAB on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays from 10.00 am to 12 midday. "We are very grateful



to the Bureau for making us so welcome and providing areas where the two justices on duty can attend," Mr Cameron said.

The role is a voluntary one and no payment is charged for the service.

Mr Cameron said the JPs would be available at the new Marlborough Library and Art Gallery from 15 May.

Council calls for feedback on future of Wither Hills Farm Park

Council wants your feedback on the future management of the Wither Hills Farm Park.

Consultation on a review of the current management plan begins today and community suggestions on what the management direction of the farm park should look like will help ensure the area best meets the needs of Marlborough residents into the future.

Council's Assets and Services Committee Chair

Councillor David Croad said the Wither Hills Farm Park is an iconic and highly valued backdrop to Blenheim and the surrounding Wairau Valley. "It plays an important role in soil conservation and is a significant recreational asset for our community," he said.

The current management plan was produced in 2003 and a lot has changed in the last 20 years. More extreme weather events associated with

climate change are already being experienced across the district.

Councillor Croad said improving the stability and resilience of this area from floods, erosion, drought and fire remains the primary purpose of the revised management plan.

"Soil conservation has been the priority for the Wither Hills Farm Park area since the 1940s and that won't change given the significant risks to the Blenheim urban area from severe erosion. However, Council appreciates the park also contributes to the quality of life for the community in a range of other ways which are likely to have evolved from those identified in the 2003 Plan - that's why we want to know how the community would like this important facility to be used in future," he said.

Once the draft management plan has been prepared there will be a further opportunity to provide feedback on that document before the revised plan is presented to Council.

Kids' edible garden booming bounty

Summer is a favourite time for children in the Kids' Edible Gardens programme.

Created by a Christchurch trust in 1995, it aims to teach students to re-use organic waste, grow organic edible gardens and eat the produce they grow.

The Marlborough programme, adapted with

permission from the Christchurch one and supported by Council, has 21 schools participating. There is a school facilitator and teaching resources have been developed to help integrate gardening with the classroom programme.

Ongoing professional development training for teachers is also provided.

Waikawa Bay School and Linkwater School have embraced the concept, Council's Environmental Educator Angela Wentworth said.

"At Linkwater, water is important and children wanted to ensure it wasn't wasted," she said. "They discovered Olla Pots, a traditional Italian irrigation method where unglazed terracotta pots are filled with water which seeps through the pores into the soil keeping it moist."

Children also made their own fertiliser using weeds from the garden soaked in a bucket of water for a week or two.

At Waikawa Bay School, children have been busy tidying and weeding the garden beds, uncovering treasures of fruit and vegetables after the summer break.

"Term four turned out to be one of their most successful growing and harvesting seasons which they attributed to the rain and using good compost," Angela said. "Children harvested cauliflower, spinach, lettuces, sugar snap peas, broad beans, radishes, celery, leeks, garlic and potatoes in time for Christmas."

Growing garlic was a particularly valuable learning

New road safety chair appointed

Councillor Jonathan Rosene has been elected chair of the Road Safety Action Planning group.

The group plays an important role in delivering the government's Road to Zero national strategy interventions to achieve a target of a 40 per cent reduction in death and serious injuries on our roads by 2030.

The Road Safety Action Planning group looks to improve road safety in Marlborough through alignment with the Road to Zero campaign by identifying crash risks. It works with the Police, ACC, Waka Kotahi, Te Whatu Ora, Marlborough Roads and Council.

Mayor Nadine Taylor endorsed Councillor Rosene's appointment and said the Road to Zero was a society wide challenge and all stakeholders needed to act together to ensure the goal set by government

"The pumpkins still have a way to go, but they are confident that their trial of planting companion sunflowers alongside them will prove to be a winner," Angela said.

was achievable.

"It's a goal we certainly want to achieve," she said.

Marlborough Road Safety Coordinator Robyn Blackburn said Road Safety Action Planning is focussed on addressing death and serious injury crashes that impact our communities through applying the Road to Zero strategy interventions. "It's time now to consolidate on the good, reflect on the not so good, work in partnership to strengthen connections and identify all local actions that can help achieve Vision Zero," she said.

Temporary changes to northern Blenheim bus route

Due to the watermain replacement works on Nelson Street, the bus stops at Seymour Square, the Marlborough Events Centre and on Nelson Street will be closed until mid-June when the project is due to be completed.

The bus route will be re-directed west after the Seymour Street stop outside Countdown, along High Street and out to the Boyce Street roundabout, before continuing as normal.

BBC Earth highlights conservation efforts at the Top of the South

Conservation partnerships in the Marlborough Sounds are hitting the international stage today with BBC Earth releasing a 12-minute video highlighting how nature can help to solve the climate crisis. The video is part of a wider effort by BBC Earth to share extraordinary stories from across the world for its #OurFrozenPlanet campaign.

Viewers can watch the video on the BBC Earth Facebook page, which has over 17 million followers. The stories feature collective conservation efforts across the top of the South Island, such as work by the Te Hoiere/Pelorus Catchment Restoration Project and Picton Dawn Chorus.

The Kotahitanga mō te Taiao Alliance and Nature Conservancy (the New Zealand arm of a global environmental not-for-profit) worked with BBC Earth and the Moondance Foundation to produce the video. Marlborough District Council is a member of the Alliance, alongside other Te Tauihu and Kawatiri councils, iwi and the Department of Conservation.

"For Marlburians, we know that the Top of the South is a special place. We love sharing our stories with the world but we know there is still much work to do to protect and enhance our natural environment," said Mayor Nadine Taylor.

"Our region has suffered two major storms in the last two years - the evidence points to the fact that climate change is bringing more frequent and more intense rainfall events to our part of the world."

"Healthy ecosystems are a key part of mitigating the

effects of climate change."

"The Te Hoiere project is an exemplar project in New Zealand and now it's an example internationally of what can be achieved when we work together for landscape-scale transformation. As a member of the Kotahitanga mō te Taiao Alliance, we know that our collective efforts are stronger than any one organisation."

In addition to Alliance membership, Council is a partner in the Te Hoiere/Pelorus Catchment Restoration Project, a landscape scale restoration initiative that brings together the catchment community and supporting partner agencies to work together. Te Hoiere/Pelorus River is the largest river catchment that flows into the Marlborough Sounds and has been identified as an exemplar catchment as a part of the Ministry for the Environment's At Risk Catchments programme and by the Department of Conservation as one of its 14 Ngā Awa rivers across New Zealand.

Small Townships



COMMUNITY PROJECTS FUND

Council allocates a percentage of the annual Small Townships budget (around \$50,000) for small, low-cost infrastructure projects on outdoor public spaces.

Any organisation or group that represents a small township or community in Marlborough can apply. This does not include Blenheim and Picton/Waikawa whose projects are funded differently.

The criteria that will be used to assess the applications will be whether the project:

- Improves an outdoor public space
- Includes a high level of community involvement and support.
- Is able to be completed within one year
- Best meets the objectives of the programme to:
 - Design a liveable town with an attractive central space
 - Allow freedom of movement, connectivity and accessibility

Funding is awarded under three categories:


Habitat Marlborough – for restoring native habitats, improving biodiversity and freshwater quality






