# **Picton Rowing Club**

## Boat naming of the new quad

### **Coxless Quad - "President"**

The new coxless quad is the first brand new racing quad the club has purchased in 20 years. The boat was supplied by SL Racing NZ and funded by the Pub Charity, who also helped fund the purchase of the sculling blades and sweep oars to go with it.

With the recent popularity of coastal rowing, our increased membership and the desire of some of our social coastal rowers to try flat water rowing and possible racing, there was demand for the club to buy a new coxless boat, to allow us to get more people on the water.

Although ordered in August last year, the new quad "President" has yet to be launched as it was only received at the beginning of February. We are looking forward to her first venture afloat.

The club has great pleasure in announcing that the

new boat has been named "President" to honour and acknowledge the huge support and effort by Jim Anderson who has been our Club President for the last 13 years and who was recently awarded a life membership for his services to the club.

Jim came to live in Picton 1979 and soon after joined the club under the tutelage of Errol Miller, Basil and Les Jones, Mike Sullivan Snr, Jack McDonald and Gary Timms Snr. He remained a member until the mid 1980's when his priorities became his new family and float plane business. His interest in rowing was rekindled in 2010, during his daughter's teenage years when she took up rowing for Wairau Rowing Club coached by John Robertson.

Jim rejoined Picton Rowing Club as a masters rower in 2010 and was elected to preside over the club the following year in 2011, after a very successful 126 year celebration. Initially he said he would take the chair for five years but thankfully he has remained a key player in the development of the club.

Jim has not only steered the club for the last 13 years, but is passionate about the sport and puts not only his time and effort into the club, but also supports the club fiscally in many ways. He works tirelessly in the background, keeping everyone on track and is always on hand to help in any way he can from driving the safety boat, coaching, cleaning, boat repairs to cooking and occasionally rowing. On Mon, Wed and Friday mornings you'll also find him working hard on the rowing machine, training with the masters men.

## New Coastal Double - Kororā - Blue Penguin - will be known as "little Blue".

The coastal double is a little version of its big blue sister – "Liber" our coastal quad and is fondly called "Little Blue" – As the boat was fully funded by the Rātā Foundation, we felt that a Māori name

was more appropriate and have chosen to call our new double Kororā – Blue Penguin.

The double was supplied by NZ Coastal Rowing and graciously fully funded by the Rata Foundation.

The development of coastal rowing has allowed our club to thrive over the last 18 months with our membership base growing from a handful of rowers to over 50. Most of these new rowers are new to the sport and joined the club to initially row recreationally and enjoy the social element and wonderful Picton harbour scenery. Most of these new members are women and aged 50+, together with a handful of junior girls who are also rowing socially.

Coastal rowing gives Picton locals, who don't have access to their own watercraft, the ability to get out on the water and make the most of living in the Marlborough Sounds .The coastal boats are bigger and more stable than conventional rowing boats which makes them easier to balance and unlikely to capsize. It's easier to learn the basic technique and being more stable allows people with limited mobility or disability to join in more easily, in a comfortable and safe environment.

The club has an open-door policy welcoming everyone, irrespective of age, experience and fitness level. It's all about giving it a go. It's a fun, social experience with no pressure. We encourage coffee, social gatherings and picnics and nonrowers can join in via use of our support boats.

Our Learn to Row Courses have become so popular that we are currently busy teaching our current beginners to row well and have put recruitment of new complete beginners on hold. However we will be doing something later in the year.






# Picton Heritage & Whaling Museum March update


### **By Mary Cooper**

I had the pleasure of meeting up with Carl and Jane Olsson and Vic and Eve Olsson on a recent visit to Wellington. They had been very helpful when I was writing a story about their father Vic Olsson. They had fond memories of growing up in Picton and I was able to show them photos from our Sporting Exhibition where they featured in skating and hockey teams. They have pointed me in the direction of another story for the Museum's mid-year newsletter. I will be catching up with them again soon.

It always gives me a "blast from the past" when I see and/or hear the steam train. Rail in Picton commenced when Brogden and Sons brought some railway workers to Picton from England in 1872 to work on the construction of the Picton




to Blenheim line which opened in 1875. The first train on the line was named the Waitohi. You might like this old photo of the railway viaduct (bottom right, previous page). I also found this photo of the "new" railway carriages introduced in the mid 1930s (below).



Did you realise that New Zealand Police Officers are, by law, unable to strike? Section 69 of the Police Act states that a strike or lockout of any number of constables is unlawful. So although we hear of police members awaiting resolution of their pay round they continue to serve us 24/7 and 365 days a year. This has been the norm for years as this article from 1936 shows (right). Another photograph from one of our calendars (main image, previous page) shows a couple of local constables Tim Healey (on the left) and Thomas Condon taken in the 1930s. Both constables had been involved with the investigation into the murder of a local man with Constable Healey's work being recognised by the Commissioner of Police for his part alongside the detectives brought in to investigate



This young girl is Mabel Gore-Browne the daughter of Sir Thomas Gore-Browne who followed Sir George Grey as the Governor of New Zealand. In 1859 when the province of Marlborough was established, Gore-Browne named the island and our town (image bottom right).

### Wheelie bins are here

New wheelie bins – which replace plastic rubbish bags – are being wheeled out in Marlborough.

From Monday, 4 March, wheelie bins will be delivered, area by area, to households in Marlborough. Delivery will continue until all areas have been covered and in time for the 1 July launch of the new service.

Please keep using your rubbish bags until the end of June – wheelie bins will not be emptied until the new service launches on 1 July.

The first area to have wheelie bins delivered is Dry Hills and the area between Alabama Road and Wither Road and west to Howick Road.

Wheelie bins will be delivered to the kerbside where residents should place them for collection when the new service rolls out.

Council's Solid Waste Manager Mark Lucas said there are approximately 36,000 bins being

delivered so people should not worry if they think they've been missed. If you have not received your bin by the beginning of June please contact Council.

Rubbish bags will not be collected after 1 July and while Council has a limited supply left, most supermarkets in the region have stopped selling them.

"People can use up their supply of rubbish bags but from 1 July these will not be collected from the kerbside. Council will continue to accept them at transfer stations, the Waste Sorting Centre, or the Resource Recovery Centre, but that option will be removed as demand diminishes," Mark said.

You can redeem your rubbish bag voucher at Council's Blenheim or Picton Service Centres or get a rebate until 30 June this year. While stocks last, rubbish bags are available to buy from Council's Blenheim or Picton Service Centre either individually (\$1.85), in packs of 10 (\$18.50) or packs of 52 (\$96.00).

The new and expanded kerbside collection service covers Blenheim, Grovetown, Havelock, Picton, Rarangi, Rai Valley, Renwick, Seddon, Spring Creek and Tua Marina with household waste collected one week and recycling the next. Two wheelie bins will be delivered to each household - one for household waste and one for recycling, except glass, which will go into the maroon crate currently

used for recycling.

### Marlborough Matariki Event Fund opens

Are you part of an organisation planning on holding an event to recognise Te Rā Aro ki a Matariki?

Council is seeking applications for the Mānawatia te Kahui o Matariki/Marlborough Matariki Event Fund which celebrates and supports the regeneration and sustainability of mātauranga Māori associated with Te Kāhui o Matariki.

Project Lead, Arts, Culture and Heritage, Nicola Neilson says the contestable fund, which is now open for applications from Marlborough community groups, organisations and individuals, aims to support events that recognise not only Te Rā Aro ki a Matariki, the public holiday, but also the wider kaupapa and principles of Matariki. "The event must take place within Marlborough and be free or low cost, family-friendly and accessible to all." Nicola said.

"The fund will support costs integral to holding an event, which includes venue and equipment hire, marketing and promotion and other costs." While there is no maximum for applications, it is likely between \$2,000 and \$3,000 will be awarded to support events.

Mrs Neilson said priority will be given to events

that can demonstrate documented support from iwi and must demonstrate how funding would advance and promote one or more of the three major principles of Matariki.

Applications for the 2024 funding round opened 8.00 am 1 March and close at 5.00 pm Monday 15 April.

# Mayor welcomes appointees to independent ferry service advisory group

Mayor Nadine Taylor has welcomed the appointments to the Ministerial Advisory Group tasked with providing independent advice and assurance on the future of KiwiRail's inter-island ferry service.

State Owned Enterprises Minister Paul Goldsmith has announced that Nelson Airport Chief

Executive Mark Thompson will chair the Ministerial Advisory Group. He will be joined by a further two members, Mark Cairns (currently a director of Freightways, Auckland International Airport and Sanford Limited) and Roger Sowry, a former MP and cabinet minister, now a professional director with considerable governance expertise.

"It's important for New Zealand that KiwiRail is focused on ensuring safe, resilient, and reliable ferry services over the short to medium term while longer term solutions for the Cook Strait connection are developed," Paul Goldsmith said late last week.

News of the appointments follow KiwiRail's recent announcement of its intention to cancel the \$555 million contract with ship builder Hyundai Mipo Dockyard in South Korea.

"This cancellation is not a fresh blow for the region - the bad news came for Marlborough last December when the Government announced it was pulling funding. At the time this was a shock, particularly to the Picton community who have been and continue to be the most directly affected by the disruptive project works," Mayor Taylor said.

The Ministry of Transport will also lead an

assessment of long-term interisland service requirements and replacement options for the Interislander ferries is expected to be part of these broader reviews.

"We have continued to make representation to the Government that we need to invest in the safety and resilience of this critical national transport connection for the long term. How and when remains the question. I am pleased to see the Government has moved quickly and we now look forward to working with the Ministerial Advisory Group," Mayor Nadine Taylor said.

The appointment of the Ministerial Advisory Group follows the Government's decision last year not to provide further funding for the Inter-Island Resilient Connection (iReX) project.

### Kaihautū joins Council

Johnny Joseph has joined Council as Kaihautū, responsible for facilitating partnerships with iwi and promoting collaborative and positive engagement with Māori within the Marlborough region.

Mayor Nadine Taylor warmly welcomed Johnny to the Council at a mihi whakatau this week.

"Council's relationships with its iwi partners are extremely important and Johnny will support us to strengthen and grow those relationships."

"Council works with iwi in many different ways and we need to build our capability and develop practical frameworks for how we work together."

# **Council proposes draft Long Term Plan budget**

Marlborough District Council is proposing a draft Long Term Plan 2024/2034 budget that sees new investment in the region's infrastructure, funds repairs to Marlborough Sounds' roads, provides increases in levels of service and removes the Council's Covid rates relief subsidy.

This year's proposed baseline rates increase is

8.47%, which includes inflation and the new wheelie bin service. The removal of the Covid rates relief subsidy, which has kept rates increases down for the last three years, leads to an additional 5.11% increase for this coming financial year. If all proposed levels of service increases and fee reviews are supported by a majority of councillors

at this Monday's Council meeting, the rates increase would be 12.63%.

Mayor Nadine Taylor said it was a challenging time financially for councils and communities right across the country.

"Like every council in New Zealand, we are facing increased costs due to factors outside our control, such as inflation, contract price increases, the ongoing impact of damaging storms and the lasting effects of the Covid pandemic."

"However, unlike some councils we are not proposing to cut services and we're continuing to invest in core infrastructure - roads, footpaths, waste management, water supply and community services and facilities - because we don't want to see Marlborough going backwards."

"Over the next 10 years our investment in infrastructure will be \$790M, which is \$85M more than our previous ten year plan, from 2021 to 2031. This year's capital expenditure on infrastructure will be in the order of \$80M," she said.

"Over the last three years the Covid Rates Relief Fund reduced rates for everyone across Marlborough by the equivalent of \$12.8M. This fund now needs to be unwound. A number of options will be proposed at Monday's meeting to soften the impact of removing this subsidy, including selling up to \$4.5 million of Councilowned carbon credits."

"A number of additional funding requests, including for new repairs and upgrades to stop banks, improvements to parks and reserves and funding a new pavilion at A&P Park in Blenheim, will also be discussed by councillors on Monday."

"One of the most significant items on Monday's agenda is the Marlborough Sounds Roading Funding Recovery. Councillors will discuss and decide on the preferred options for funding our local share of the \$234 million repair and improvement costs so that we can get on with the job of fixing the Sounds' roads," Mayor Taylor said.

The Long Term Plan 2024/2034 will go out for public consultation from 4 April to 6 May and include public meetings and hearings; dates and locations will be confirmed.
