# Picton Heritage & Whaling Museum

### November update

Our 2024 calendars can be purchased from the Museum – same price as last year - \$20.

I was pleased to see that Rangitāne o Wairau, Ngāti Toa Rangitira and Ngāti Rārua have taken responsibility for the clearing of weeds and invasive plants from Horahora Kākahu Island in Port Underwood. This was where the British raised the Union Jack in 1840 to proclaim sovereignty over the South Island and the iwi are pleased to exercise kaitiakitanga (guardianship) for the island which was returned to them through Treaty of Waitangi settlements.

We have two exhibitions at present. A sporting exhibition featuring bowls, roller skating (main image), hockey and rowing. There is also the People of Picton exhibition (above right) where we have on display many of the photographs sent to the museum in May. We will be having



an afternoon event on November 4 to open it. The main wall is pictured but there are two other walls on display.

Whenever I'm out walking in Marlborough, however remote, I can see the traps being set by pest control agencies. These volunteers are doing a magnificent job putting in traps and checking them. I can hear the difference they are making by the amount and variety of bird

song I hear. Well done to them for continuing to try to eliminate stoats and weasels which have been a problem in Marlborough for the last 130 years - as can be seen in this 1893 article below.

STOATS AND WEASELS. – In the course of a discussion at a meeting of the Philosophical Society (says the Post), Mr Canavan stated that some stoats and weasels which had been liberated on a sheep station 40 miles away had reached the Mahakipawa district, between Pelorus Sound and Queen Charlotte Sound, and destroyed the wekas and kiwis which used to live there. Mr W M Maskell thought that the fact that stoats and weasels neglected to kill the rabbits but turned their attention to native birds, ought to become generally known. Mr W T L Travers maintained that the stoats were very useful in exterminating rats, but he was afraid that as soon as the latter had gone the stoats would make great havoc among the fowls.

The museum has this fold out card, showing NZ birds, for sale at \$8.



November 5th is Parihaka Day remembering the invasion of Parihaka by 1500 armed constabulary in 1881 who were there to remove the Maori people and acquire their land for settlers. It is thought that Mahatma Gandhi read about Parihaka and that their peaceful resistance to the invaders inspired his peaceful protest. It was 2019 before the Government issued an apology for the brutality of the invasion.





### **Picton Dawn Chorus**

#### From students to trainers



Three terms of learning in the field has paid off for these enthusiastic, hard working young trappers. A group of year 5 & 6 students have been going out rain or shine to check their school trap line three times a week, with weekly support from Picton Dawn Chorus Urban Trapping Coordinator.

This involves checking and clearing the area, cleaning and re-baiting traps then setting the rat traps in the weka proof boxes. They also record all their data and share it with local community group Picton Dawn Chorus.

The students along with their teacher Miss Faulkner approached me with the idea to hold a community trapping demonstration. The students set up and ran the demonstration for their friends and family, showing the skills they had learnt throughout the year. Any people who were interested then came and collected



their traps for a koha from the team at Picton Dawn Chorus who were there on the day to support the school.



The afternoon was a great success, with help from Predator FreeNZ we gained a fantastic number of new Backyard Trappers.

Urban trapping plays an important role in our local area, supporting the work being done in the hills and surrounding areas by PDC volunteers and bush trapping staff.

Urban trapping in Picton and Waikawa is included in the "buffer block" protecting the "core block" of Kaipupu Point. The urban area includes the suburban gardens, parks and reserves within Picton and Waikawa. The urban area plays an important role by providing a diverse habitat and an abundant food supply for native species, working as a spillover site from Kaipupu Point and Victoria Domain, and providing an immigration buffer for pests.

The urban area is approximately 402ha in size and contains approximately 2,500 resident households.

Waikawa Bay School makes up 3ha of this project and as you can see from the graph below are definitely doing their bit to help our community become predator free.

# Marlborough Sounds Future Access Study wins national award

"This award reflects the extensive community engagement done to date. While we are not at the end of our journey, I am proud of the way Council has stepped up to face this challenge. I particularly want to acknowledge the Marlborough Sounds community for whom this long road to recovery continues and whose involvement in this study was critical and hugely valued," Mayor Taylor said.

Council's objective through the study has been to provide a safe and resilient transport network for residents, homeowners and businesses in affected areas of the Marlborough Sounds following damage from significant storm events in July 2021 and August 2022.

People were displaced from their homes due to the risk from slips and impacts on dwellings

following water damage, structural damage or land instability. Damage to the roading network and marine services again resulted in the isolation of numerous communities.

Thirty-two properties were red stickered and 63 yellow stickered due to the damage sustained in the August 2022 event, which was more extensive and widespread than the previous 2021 event. Most of these properties face high or moderate risk from on-going land instability. The transport repair programme is estimated to be in the order of \$234M.

The Marlborough Sounds is a rural area with a population that is up to four hours' drive to the nearest main population centre, with many having their principal home outside of the region. Despite these challenges well over a thousand people engaged face-toface, alongside regular e-communication, videos, and well-designed documentation. Record numbers of people participated in two community surveys – over 900 and 1,700 respectively.

"The MSFAS is designed to provide long-term certainty for businesses and residents impacted by these storm events in the Sounds and considers the impacts of changes in weather patterns caused by climate change," Mayor Taylor said.

"The aim is to map a pathway for the shortterm while understanding the implications for the long term. It was identified early on that the conversation about the long term was needed now. Residents and businesses have been vociferous in their demands for the reinstatement of the network. "

The 532-page Programme Business Case prepared as a result of the community engagement process was recently submitted to Waka Kotahi for funding consideration.

#### Stamp out fanworm before it establishes

Mediterranean Fanworm (Sabella spallanzanii) is an invasive marine pest that poses a huge threat to the Marlborough Sounds.

It can quickly form dense colonies out competing other organisms with tubes growing up to 80cm, producing up to 1,000 tubes per square metre. They grow predominately on hard surfaces including boat hulls, marine structures and the sea floor.

Fanworm has the potential to be costly to vessel owners, marine farmers and port companies as it can be very difficult and expensive to remove and can compete with mussels for food, Council's Senior Biosecurity Officer Liam Falconer said.

"It's already well established in Auckland, the upper North Island and Lyttleton, and therefore can easily arrive on boats coming here as we've seen in the past," Liam said. "Fanworm can take hold quickly, if anyone suspects they have seen it, they should contact Council Biosecurity team immediately."

Mediterranean fanworm has previously been detected in Marlborough following routine inspections by Council contracted divers. It has generally been found on boat hulls in areas missed with antifoul or in high wear areas where it had rubbed off Liam said.

"Our extensive surveillance programme has indicated we don't have any established populations in Marlborough and the long-



term goal is to keep it that way," he said. "It is an offence to knowingly bring Mediterranean fanworm into Marlborough."

If you haven't prepared your vessel correctly and you're travelling to the upper north, it's highly likely that you will bring fanworm home with you.

Working with the marine farming industry and marina operators was a valuable tool in preventing Mediterranean fanworm spread, Liam said.

#### Te Tauihu Regional Events Fund reopens

If you've got an idea for an event that will encourage visitors to Marlborough, or you want to grow an existing event, the Te Tauihu Regional Events Fund may be able to help.

In September 2020, Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment (MBIE) allocated \$1.5m to Marlborough, Nelson and Tasman to support the tourism and event sectors in response to Covid-19's impact on international tourism.

This enabled the creation of the Te Tauihu Regional Events Fund to facilitate and fund events that drive visitation.

Marlborough's share of the \$1.5m is \$540,000 and until recently was fully allocated.

However, due to a change in requirements for some of the previously supported events, funding is available once again.

If you have a great new event idea that you need seed funding for or require financial support to help grow an existing event you are invited to apply by submitting an expression of interest.

#### Gum tree to be removed from Waitohi Domain

A Eucalyptus tree in poor health on Waitohi Domain in Picton will be removed to make way for a temporary bridge to support the Picton Ferry Terminal Precinct Redevelopment (iReX) project.

Council's Assets and Services Committee approved removal of the tree subject to full Council at a recent meeting on the condition that removal costs will be covered by Downer HEB JV, who are delivering the main construction works.

A suitable new tree will be planted at the end of the project.

"Once the iReX project is complete any green space areas affected by the construction works will be restored to an agreed landscape plan in conjunction with Council and Te Atiawa, so this area will be improved in time," Manager Parks and Open Spaces Jane Tito said.

The tree is on the northern side of the park next to the Waitohi Stream and its removal will allow a temporary bridge to be built between Waitohi Domain and the KiwiRail works area to support the construction works related to the iReX project.

"Council met with Downer HEB JV to discuss the removal request. The tree is in poor health and after an independent assessment, an arborist has confirmed it is unlikely to recover so removal was recommended," Ms Tito said.
