iReX Project

iReX project winds down in Waitohi Picton

At the end of last year, the Government announced that the increase in construction costs for iReX (Interislander's ferry terminal redevelopment and new ships project) were too great to continue the project.

The iReX team is now focused on winding down the project. For Waitohi Picton this means making sure all sites are left safe and tidy and completing the strengthening work on the Waitohi Awa culvert.

KiwiRail is working in partnership with Marlborough District Council and the NZ Transport Agency Waka Kotahi (NZTA) about what next for the transport network around the Port.

Marlborough Mayor Nadine Taylor says Council is working closely with all parties involved to get

more certainty for the Picton community about the Dublin Street overbridge and the Kent/Wairau Street upgrades. "We understand there is intense interest in the 'where to from here' and we are working with KiwiRail and NZTA to answer the community's questions."

Interislander Programme Director David Warburton says last year's decision marks the end of the iReX project, but not KiwiRail's work with Government, partners, community and staff on finding an alternative solution for Interislander.

"Everyone accepts that investment is needed to deliver a reliable, safe and sustainable Cook Strait Service.

"Waitohi Picton is a special town with good people who've been extremely supportive of the Interislander and the iReX project. We'll continue to keep in touch with everyone as new plans emerge," David Warbuton says.

"For Interislander it is business as usual. We were always planning to run the current fleet until 2026.

"Safety and reliability continues to be a huge

focus for the team and we're proud to say that during December, one of our busiest months, Interislander delivered 100 per cent reliability with 94 per cent on time performance. For January we continued to provide a reliable service, closing the month at 99 per cent reliability and 92 per cent ontime performance.







Water restrictions ease in Picton and Waikawa

As water restrictions ease in Picton and Waikawa, residents and visitors are still encouraged to save water and make 'every drop count.'

From today Picton and Waikawa residents can use sprinklers again on alternate days as well as handheld hoses. Flushing of boat motors is permitted and light boat washing is now allowed but should be kept to a minimum. Reduced Council irrigation continues at Endeavour Park.

The popular water play area on the Picton Foreshore will also reopen on weekends and public holidays from 9am to 9pm, Council's Operations and Maintenance Engineer Stephen Rooney said.

"We thank the community for their efforts over the past few weeks but do encourage continued conservation of water to avoid a return to tighter water restrictions. With warm and dry weather still ahead of us it makes good sense to still make every drop count," he said. The revised restrictions are:

- Hand-held hoses permitted for watering gardens
- A property with an even numbered street address may use sprinklers only on even numbered calendar days
- A property with an odd numbered street address may use sprinklers only on odd numbered calendar days
- Only one tap may be used at a time to run a sprinkler or sprinkler systems
- The term sprinkler means any hose which is not held and directed by hand
- Boat motor flushing and light boat washing is permitted but should be kept to a minimum
- Reduced Council irrigation at Endeavour Park

No water use by cruise ships

Water restrictions have been in place in Picton and Waikawa since early January when water stopped flowing over the Essons Valley dam due to low rainfall, high levels of evapotranspiration and high summer demand, leaving the township reliant on the Speeds Road supply and reservoirs at the Elevation and Victoria Domain. Adequate levels must be retained in the reservoirs to cater for power outages at Speeds Road and for firefighting purposes.

"Since then, process modifications have been

made to the Essons Valley water treatment plant which enables the treatment of lower quality water. This change has been possible due to recent changes in the Drinking Water Quality Assurance Rules allowing a change to the UV dose process," Mr Rooney said.

The restrictions apply to all properties on the Picton and Waikawa supply until further notice.

Queen Charlotte Drive closures

Daytime road closures are planned for Queen Charlotte Drive from 7 February for up to three weeks.

The road will be closed about 1.8km from the SH6/ Havelock turnoff near Cullen Point, Mahakipawa Hill, on weekdays from 9am until 3pm with hourly openings, on the hour, to let traffic through.

Outside of the closure period, works will continue under stop/go traffic management.

These works are for the construction of an earth

wall, along with drainage upgrades.

Works are being undertaken at various sites on Queen Charlotte Drive, between Cullen Point and Shakespeare Bay, including a retaining wall near Aussie Bay and surfacing and finishing works at a new retaining wall site near Momorangi Bay campsite.

These sites are under stop/go traffic management.

Motorists are warned of increased truck movements and are urged to plan for delays.

Disposing of batteries safely

Fire risk is front of mind during summer but did you know you might be creating a fire risk by disposing of batteries in your household waste?

Council's Solid Waste Manager Mark Lucas says when batteries are put in the rubbish or recycling, they end up in the landfill where they can create a fire risk. "As all of the waste is compacted either in a collection truck, transfer station or landfill there is a potential that this will cause sparks and start a fire, posing a risk to staff and the environment," Mark said.

"Even if they don't cause a fire, old batteries contain chemicals and other materials that are harmful to the environment. They take over 100 years to break down, so we do not want them in the landfill at all. Also, as all batteries are recyclable, and in Marlborough we recycle batteries, there is no reason for them to go to landfill in the first place," he said.

Batteries are found in all manner of gadgets, toys, power tools, phones, laptops and many other devices. "When it's time to dispose of a battery,

don't throw it out - bring it to one of Council's small battery recycling bins," Mark said.

"There is no charge to drop off batteries at any of our collection points - the costs are covered by your rates. If you have vehicle batteries or damaged small batteries, please take them straight to the Hazardous Waste Centre on Wither Road in Blenheim, opposite the Resource Recovery Centre."

Some helpful tips:

- Use rechargeable batteries instead of singleuse ones where possible
- Sell or donate unwanted, battery-powered electronic items instead of throwing them away

World-leading technology will aid Tory Channel mariners

A groundbreaking visual aid providing realtime guidance for mariners on current and tide conditions in Tory Channel/Kura te Au goes live on Marlborough District Council's website on Monday.

The world-leading technology is the result of more than two years of work as part of Council's Tide and Current Project, run in conjunction with marine and oceanographic survey experts Oceanum, Calypso Science and iXblue, and was presented to the Environment and Planning Committee today. The model has been made possible due to Council's investment in the HS51 multibeam survey of Queen Charlotte Sound/ Tōtaranui in 2016/17 which captured detailed bathymetric data.

Tory Channel/Kura te Au, the main trunk line for ferries travelling between the North and South islands, has long had a reputation amongst mariners as a complex waterway, Harbourmaster Captain Jake Oliver told the committee.

"Actual currents and expected currents are not

always the same which means mariners cannot be certain of the conditions until they have entered the channel. The tide and current model 'nowcasts' real-time information on the actual flow conditions

at the entrance to the channel and will be free to use," he said. "There is a high degree of accuracy, and we have confidence in the model. We can project 24 hours ahead and look back at the previous 24 hours as well."

The Tide and Current Project was funded with \$250,000 received from KiwiRail, given to Council as part of an enforceable undertaking imposed on the ferry service following an accident on the Kaiarahi Interislander ferry in April 2019.

Council owns the model, but Oceanum who have developed the product, mathematical models, and visual aids will be able to use the technology developed for other applications around the world. "The technology has the potential to be much more than a navigational safety tool," Captain Oliver said.

"The only Council investment has been staff time and energy," he said. Cawthron Institute were also contracted to assist with water flow measurements and data computers on some of the interisland ferries have helped validate the model.

"Without the multibeam data we would not have been able to understand the shape of the Tory channel. Now we will begin looking at the feasibility of expanding the project to encompass the whole of Queen Charlotte Sound/ Tōtaranui," Captain Oliver said.

Tide and current conditions in Tory Channel/Kura te Au are significant with currents up to seven knots (13 km/h) having been confirmed in full flood conditions. These currents add complexity to the challenge of navigating safely in this narrow and winding channel.

In the past twenty years there have been at least five serious grounding or near grounding incidents at the Tory Channel/Kura te Au entrance involving a large ferry or another type of ship. The most recent ship grounding was the grounding of the Cruise Ship Azamara Quest in January 2016.

The novel new visual aid will also be available in time via the Marlborough Cruise Guide.

Marlborough officially a Welcoming Community

Marlborough is now a Committed Welcoming Community under the Welcoming Communities – Te Waharoa ki ngā Hapori - banner.

Council submitted an application before Christmas for stage one accreditation and just heard it had been achieved, Marlborough Welcoming Communities Coordinator Heather Barnes said.

A Committed Welcoming Community values newcomers and is committed to building a welcoming and inclusive community. It has also taken active steps to create an environment where all residents can thrive and belong.

There are 34 councils taking part in the programme - Marlborough joins 16 other councils in the programme that have achieved accreditation under the four-stages of accreditation.

Building strong connections with newcomers is the aim of Marlborough's Welcoming Communities programme.

Accreditation involves an assessment of efforts to include and welcome newcomers - recent migrants, former refugees and international

students. Accredited communities can then showcase their achievements to the world with pride.

Welcoming Communities is a programme led by Immigration New Zealand in partnership with the Ministry of Ethnic Communities and Human Rights Commission.

Rural sports funding open
