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# Marlborough District Libraries Activity Report – Looking Back at the Year Ended 30 June 2024

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The following is a record of events, programmes, and happenings in the libraries July 2023 – June 2024.

#### Children's Programming

School holidays, Summer Reading and regular activities are all vital parts of the libraries annual programming with many families participating.

#### a) Summer Reading Programme - Pizza Fiesta

The theme of the 23/24 Summer Reading Programme was "Pizza Fiesta", providing a programme that crossed all age groups from young school to teens.

700 children participated in the programme across the district. 406 reached the halfway point, winning themselves an ice block and 377 children totally completed the programme winning themselves a book of their choice.



Children signed up to read over the holidays and for every 15 minutes reading completed they create and compile their pizzas, with various paper-based toppings. Children also participated in other Library holiday activities; weekly code cracker hunt, Lego building, etc, that went towards completing this year's programme.

The programme was simplified this year following feedback from parents, saying they sometimes struggled to find time in their busy summer schedules to visit the library. The programme was designed so that it could be completed in two visits, if necessary.

Parents rated the *Motivation to read* as the most valued aspect of the programme.

Other comments included:

"My child is not an everyday reader, so this was great encouragement."

"We are very grateful to be able to do this and look forward to the programme every year".

"This challenge really motivated my son to keep reading in the holidays when there was so much else to do. He looked forward to going to the library to do his pizza toppings. The sweet pizza cooking class was a real incentive".

#### b) School Holiday Programmes

Attendance at school holiday programmes record good numbers with a variety of activities offered at both libraries. They have included:


- Code Cracker challenges
- Scheduled story times with drop-in craft and activities
- Colouring in
- Lego in a cup challenge
- Lego, Duplo and Games available to play
- Activities for Tweens
- Family movie times

The Library Code Cracker Challenge was popular with Children and caregivers. Children were asked to answer clues to find the letter in the code cracker. The questions were designed to encourage exploration of the library and aimed to accommodate a range of ages – from under 5s through to tweens.

Children also enjoyed using the available computers to access digital learning opportunities (and games!)

#### PressReader – online newspapers



Marlborough District Libraries subscribe to PressReader, the largest selection of newspapers and magazines from over 120 countries in over 60 languages. 7,000 publications on a single platform available to read on the day of publication. Readers can also instantly translate articles in up to 21 languages. This resource is able to be used in the library or from home on members own device with free access provided through your library card.

#### Solar Panels

During July 2023 the solar panels were installed on the roof of Te Kahu o Waipuna and became fully operational from September, so we do not have a full year's data on the performance of the system.

Over the lifetime of the system, it has generated nearly 35% of our total energy requirements. During the hours of sunshine in summer, the system provides approximately 50% of our consumption.

The facility has been tuned to maximise energy use from the solar array and it has utilised over 94% of the energy produced.



#### **Working To Be Dementia Friendly Revalidation**

In 2021 Marlborough District Libraries was recognised as Working to be Dementia Friendly, with Picton Library and Service Centre being the first Library in New Zealand to be recognised in this way.

Becoming a Dementia Friendly organisation shows you are a safe; friendly; accepting and supportive place for people with dementia. It also demonstrates commitment to make life easier for customers and staff. Every two years revalidation is required which has been completed.

Both libraries have a strong working relationship with Marlborough Alzheimers. Picton Library facilitate two regular sessions with their clients monthly.



Marlborough Book Festival was held on 20 - 23 July 2023, commencing with a talk by author, Nick Bollinger, held on the Atrium stairs in Te Kahu o Waipuna.

Twenty-three sessions were held featured 16 authors.

The events were held at the ASB Theatre Marlborough and Te Kahu o Waipuna. The inspiring, informative and entertaining weekend was well attended, with a number of sessions fully subscribed.

#### Digital Drop-in Stats December 2023 to June 2024

Digital Drop-in (previously known as Walk in Wednesday) debuted on the first week Wednesday of December 2023 at both libraries, as a six-month trial to assess demand.

Customers feedback was very positive with most giving 5-star ratings, with the lowest being 3-star.

Sounds based Councillors have been hosting monthly drop-in sessions at Picton Library and Service Centre Waitohi Whare Mātauranga. The community are invited to join Councillors for a cup of tea and a chat where they can provide advice, information and assistance with Council-related matters.



#### St John Therapy Pets

St John Therapy Pets are one of the St John Community Care Programmes. It was set up in the winter of 2022 with the first recruits beginning volunteering a few months later.

Therapy pets are visiting Picton Library and Service Centre and Te Kahu o Waipuna fortnightly where residents of all ages, as well as visitors to our region, can pat, chat, or read to these furry visitors.

#### Matariki @ Te Kahu o Waipuna

Marlborough Library, along with Marlborough Art Gallery and Marlborough Youth Council held a successful Matariki celebration at Te Kahu o Waipuna on the evening of 26 June 2024.

More than 250 people came through the door during the beginning of the event to mark the start of the Māori New Year.

Following the mihi whakatau the Queen Charlotte College Kapa Haka Group set the tone for the evening with their performance full of warmth and meaning.

In the Children's Library the main lights were switched off, and with a twinkling of lights through the 'tree', children and adults alike listened and read-along to Matariki stories in Te Reo and English, read by Rina Pinker. Aligning with the whānau experience, Rina introduced her Mum, Connie, who brought out her guitar and encouraged the gathering to sing waiata and move their tinana (body).

Matariki themed crafts for the tamariki, and a guided tour of Ngāti Rārua's Te Heke Whakangā exhibition in the Art Gallery meant there was something for everyone to enjoy over the course of the evening.

Marlborough Youth Council manned the BBQ, and it was wonderful to see lots of families enjoying the free kai in the courtyard and foyer.
