Marlborough flies high at airline's mayoral forum

This year the annual get together hosted by New Zealand's national carrier included a panel discussion where Mayor Taylor sat alongside Nelson Mayor Nick Smith and Rotorua Mayor Tania Tapsell

'The forum gives invited mayors with airports in their province a chance to share key regional issues with the airline's leadership group including CEO Greg Foran and hear updates from Air New Zealand's leadership in return," Mayor Taylor said.

"It was a great platform for me to be able to share the incredible work already being done in the aviation and aerospace sector in Marlborough as well as to speak to the key issues facing our region," she said.

Marlborough Airport Limited is a wholly owned subsidiary of Council and it is a core piece of regional infrastructure along with Port Marlborough NZ Limited, also 100 per cent owned by Council

Mayor Taylor said it was critical Council had this strategic stake in the transport connectivity of the region whether it be for the purposes of visiting friends and family, freight, tourism or in emergencies

Marlborough Airport saw 318,500 passenger movements last year, a bumper year after recovering from three years of fewer travellers due to Covid-19 restrictions

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Mayor Taylor said she was keen to see Marlborough become a centre of excellence for aviation and aerospace.

"Next year, the public will begin to see the tangible investments that Council is making to prepare for the future with a significant runway reseal project," she said

"And we continue to lead in aviation firsts with our partnership with Air New Zealand and Wellington Airport to trial an electric aircraft to replace its Q300 domestic fleet. Electric is part of Marlborough's aviation future, and we are very excited to be part of this first for New Zealand."

Calling all artists - it's Chorus cabinet time

A brightly coloured artwork that transformed a grey telecommunications cabinet in Old Renwick Road was a family project say spanning

Council is now looking for artists to submit designs for the nine sites confirmed in this ear's initiative

Mel said she submitted the concept design with the intention of turning it into an ntergenerational project, that she and her granddaughter, Lucia, could paint together.

"When we discovered that we had won the chance to paint a Chorus cabinet, we were thrilled," she said. "Our design depicts a honey pot and showcases a bee diligently collecting pollen from Manuka flowers.'

The pair spent a weekend transforming the cabinet and Mel said it was a great opportunity to teach Lucia new skills.

'She gained confidence in her abilities as we worked side by side," said Mel. "We involved the homeowner where the box was located

who was very complimentary about the new artwork in front of his home.

The Chorus cabinet art initiative began in 2010 with a pilot in Auckland and was so successful it was extended throughout the country with 170 murals on average completed each year.

Councillor Jonathan Rosene said it was a way of reducing vandalism on telecommunication cabinets as well as promoting a sense of community pride.

"This year, we are particularly keen to see designs that have a story to tell and/or show a relationship between the work and the site and the community," he said. "Particularly how it enhances the space or public surroundings and promotes community

Council's first quarter rates instalment delayed

If you have been looking out for your next rates instalment, please be assured it is coming but there is a delay.

Council's first rates instalment of the new financial year would usually have been sent out by now but ratepayers may have noticed it has not yet arrived.

Chief Financial Officer Geoff Blake said the delay was due to a very complex Long Term Plan (LTP) process with many issues that have needed to be considered along the way, not least of which the Marlborough Sounds roading recovery funding and higher than expected insurance premium cost increases.

"Finalising the LTP, including the required audit, is taking longer than expected due to all these complexities. The length of the delay is not yet known but the draft of the LTP is complete and it is now with the auditors who are well progressed through their work," Mr Blake said.

"Our Council is not the only local authority in the country to find itself in this situation. At this point Council is targeting end of August for the audited LTP to be ready for adoption by full Council but that is not yet confirmed."

As soon as the LTP is adopted Council's rates team will prepare the rates notice which includes the first quarter of rates to be paid.

Ratepayers will have 14 days to pay this once received.

'We hope to send this out to ratepayers in the first half of September but as soon as we have a date we will share this information." Mr Blake said.

Direct debits will continue to be processed at current rates and payments will be offset against future rates. If ratepayers who do not have direct debits wish to make a payment towards their rates, to help them with their cashflow, then this can be done by internet banking or calling into Council's Blenheim or Picton Service Centres.

Only rain goes down the drain - let's keep our waterways clean

Marlborough residents are being reminded that 'only rain goes down the drain' following a series of pollution events in a Springlands waterway.

A concerned member of the public recently wrote to Council to advise they'd observed fish heads in Murphy's Creek, Council Stormwater Lead Jon Cunliffe said.

"Following the fish head observation a second member of the public rang in to report heavy discolouration in the same creek. Council staff confirmed this on inspection and further determined this had occurred on three separate

"While we can't be sure what caused the discolouration, each of these events occurred at around the same time of day, and it's thought that it may have



been from a painter washing out brushes into an outside stormwater receiver at a worksite in the area.

The placement of the fish heads in the creek is likely the result of poor consideration of where to dump waste, or that the culprit or culprits may have been using them for eeling.

"We're asking residents and commercial operators throughout Marlborough to avoid using our waterways as dumping grounds; and to be mindful of what they're putting down our stormwater drains. These lead straight to our waterways and then the sea," Jon said.

"Our waterways are home to many different species, and it's important that we don't jeopardise their habitats with pollutants for the sake of our

Enduring environmental gains from Jobs for Nature funding

Environmental runs on the board will endure despite the funding for the Jobs for Nature Restoring and Protecting Flora Project finishing

Major weed infestations threatening high-value ecosystems at 150 sites across Marlborough, Buller, Nelson and Tasman have been controlled by the Kotahitanga mō te Taiao Alliance (KMTT) landscape-scale weed project through the Jobs for Nature funding which finished at the end of May.

In Marlborough 11 sites were targeted as part of the project involving approximately 900 ha.

More than 12,000 pest plants were destroyed over the lifetime of the project. including willows, wilding pines, and wild kiwifruit vines.

"Funds were made available to the Department of Conservation in 2021 as part of the Covid-19 recovery Jobs for Nature initiative for biodiversity gains at the top of the South Island," Council's Rob Simonds, the Operational Support Liaison for the project in Marlborough said.

"DOC signed a funding deed with The Nature Conservancy who were also engaged to project manage on behalf of the KMTT Alliance partners. Our focus was on short term high impact weed control programmes in areas with high biodiversity values. We wanted to focus on those sites that could make a meaningful impact on conservation values in conjunction with community groups so that the environmental gains made will not be lost," he said.

In Marlborough these included supporting the Hinepango Wetland Restoration Group, and nearby Te Whanau Hou Grovetown Lagoon which is doing restoration work on the south bank of Kelly's Creek.

"The Flora Project collaborated with Council, the Department of Conservation and the Hinepango Wetland Restoration Group to help do the heavy lifting and open the Hinepango Wetlands up for planting and ongoing maintenance weed control," Rob said. "This is a great example of Jobs for Nature working with community groups for a single outcome - the restoration and enhancement of a valuable ecological area."

Letticia Dodson from the Hinepango Wetland Restoration Group extended her thanks to the KMTT Alliance, the Kūmānu team and Council.

"The work undertaken by the project team has given us a huge leap forward in terms of controlling old man's beard and willows in the wetland. It is going to be an ongoing battle but already we can see a lot of natural regeneration happening and the previously choked natives beginning to flourish now that the canopy is thinning," she said.

"The weed control work under the project has also opened new areas for our group to control and plant - areas we would not have accessed for several years to come. I believe the Hinepango Wetland will continue to benefit from the contributions of the KMTT Alliance project well into the future."

Hudson Dodd, Project Manager for KMTT, said that the project would not have been possible without the support of DOC Jobs for Nature, the collaboration of the KMTT partners, and the wider community.

"Our vision is to bring everyone together for long-term landscapescale collaboration, and these last three years have demonstrated that by working together we can achieve major improvements in biodiversity for the Top of the South that will make a difference for so many special remnant native ecosystems and taonga species.

Council's mobile app Antenno is a great way to keep up to date with important Council alerts.

Free to install, Antenno is available on both Apple and Android smartphones and no personal information or login details are required. You simply save the locations you want to be informed about, such as your home address, workplace or school.

When Council posts an update relevant to your chosen locations, you receive a notification.

While most posts are specific to your location, some notifications like sports ground closures are published district-wide.

This means no matter where a team is playing, they'll have the relevant information. During rainfall and flooding events, road closure information changes quickly.

In these instances, Antenno updates link to information on Council's website. These notifications are sent out district-wide to ensure they reach as many people as quickly as possible.
