Chlorination plans on track

Design has begun for chlorinating Blenheim's water supply.

National water regulator Taumata Arowai requires a residual disinfectant, typically provided by chlorine, to be added to water supplies by 31 December this year. That deadline won't be met, but systems should be in place by mid-2025.

Council's Planning and Development Engineer Stuart Donaldson said Taumata Arowai had reinforced the need for Blenheim's water supply to be chlorinated to ensure it met the Water Services Act and the Drinking Water Quality Assurance Rules.

While Blenheim's water, which delivers water to 10,700 households, is currently treated for protozoa and bacteria, there is no chlorine dosing

Taumata Arowai has outlined that the Water Services Act 2021 requires suppliers to use a multi-barrier approach to managing risks to protect drinking water from contamination

Mr Donaldson said a permanent chlorination plant would be built, for which design was already underway.

Chlorine is a safe, simple and inexpensive way to disinfect drinking water, capable of killing most common bacteria including campylobacter and norovirus. It's generally used alongside other processes such as protozoa barriers which remove or inactivate single celled parasites such as cryptosporidium and giardia. Supplies in enwick, Picton, Havelock, Wairau Valley, Seddon and Rural Awatere are chlorinated

Budget has been set aside in the Council's Long Term Plan for chlorinating the supply.

Council team has gardens in great shape

'In the two weeks leading up to Garden Marlborough they are doing exactly what all gardeners do - pulling weeds, tying plants up, planting gardens, planting to fill spaces, gravelling pathways, washing structures down and cleaning seats," Council's Garden Manager Brad Molony said.

Churchill Glade, site of Sunday's garden fête, is mown regularly, weeds dealt with and trees pruned so it is at its best for the popular event.

Council has often provided sites and designed and built gardens for workshops. Garden staff have also provided raw materials for workshops. Council has also provided staff to help manage the bus tours, workshops and act as guides.

National water reform work ramps up

Work is underway on one of the most significant reforms faced by councils around New Zealand in recent times -Central Government's Local Water Done Well legislation.

This work will allow each council to make the decision on whether to combine resources into a single water entity or to go it alone as individual councils. Nelson City Council has already voted to go it alone under their existing service model.

Students work to control oxygen weed with harakeke

Marlborough Girls' College students teamed up with Council staff recently to collaborate on a trial to control oxygen weed.

Year 13 students Grace Allen and Mackenzie Goodall led the project for two years, taking inspiration from a field trip. The aim was to try and control the growth of oxygen weed in Fulton Creek, which runs along the college's boundary using weed mats

The pair designed two different mats a traditional, black synthetic mat, and a hand-woven, natural harakeke, or flax one

The students approached Mayor Nadine Taylor and Council Stormwater Lead Jon Cunliffe to ensure routine spraying near the creek was suspended while weed mats were in place. They asked year 10 student Celia Spencer to weave the harakeke mat with science teacher Melynda Bentley noting the importance of having the mat weaved by someone with knowledge of tikanga, or Māori custom.

"My mum and Nan have been weaving for ages, so I sort of just picked it up while I was growing up," Celia said.

Having obtained the support of Council and commissioned the harakeke mat, Grace and Mackenzie were able to complete their trial, and results were presented at the Marlborough secondary schools' Scitec Science and Technology Fair on 24 September

"The black, traditional weed mat helped, but over time it started breaking down, polluting the creek, which isn't great. The harakeke mat also worked well, but because of the small holes in the weave light was getting in, which allowed some oxygen weed to grow through the mat. Grace said.

Springlands Stormwater Governance Group was also involved with the project and had the opportunity to visit the trial site and hear about the project alongside iwi representatives, Councillors and staff.

"We were very impressed with what we saw during our visit," Mr Cunliffe said.

The trial sparked many questions, which Grace and Mackenzie will leave for future students to explore. The pair would like to acknowledge their work with students Lucy Heath in 2023 and Myjl Yukoya in 2024.

Cruise season starts in Marlborough

The first cruise ship of summer marked the beginning of a strong season for cruise tourism in Marlborough

The Crown Princess's arrival into Picton was celebrated with a formal ceremony, where Mayor Nadine Taylor and members of Port Marlborough's Port and Marine team presented the ship's captain with a locally made plaque and a gift of Marlborough wine.

Port Marlborough Chief Executive Rhys Welbourn said the Crown Princess's maiden visit was a wonderful way to open the season. "We are honoured to have welcomed the captain and crew to Picton for the first time," he said. "Our region is ready for another strong cruise season, with both local businesses and the wider community set to benefit. The economic impact of cruise tourism is undeniable, and it is great to see Marlborough once again thriving as a key destination."

"Environmental sustainability is a key focus for Port Marlborough, and we are working closely with the cruise industry to balance economic benefits with environmental and community outcomes. This includes working with other agencies to ensure that all visiting ships adhere to the highest internationa maritime environmental standards.'

Port Marlborough continues to invest in the region's long-term infrastructure. Alonaside cruise-specific improvements. the port has introduced a new \$11.5m tugboat. Kajana, to boost resilience and environmental efficiency

Other projects include sealing the Shakespeare Bay log yard and installing a water truck for dust suppression an investment aimed at improving environmental outcomes. Upgrades to the wharf fendering system on Waimahara Wharf, valued at \$2M, are also underway to enhance resilience and capacity.

With 48 total berthside calls, including nine maiden visits scheduled for the season, Port Marlborough expects that Picton will maintain its position as a preferred destination for international cruise tourism
